

June letter

By the time this edition of In Touch appears I shall be on my way to Italy. Why? It is June and the holiday season is beginning. Many of you will also be thinking about holidays, in the next few months. Those of you with school age children will be wrestling with the usual problem of the greater expense of going away in the school holidays, others, like me, will hope to avoid the July/August period. We all, now, in our modern society, expect a week or two of change, rest and recuperation at some point during the year. However, things were not always so. In earlier times, work, perhaps on the land, or in domestic service, for example, did not stop for a 'holiday'.

The word itself, 'holiday' is an abbreviation of 'holy day', originally one of the Feasts of the Church, which were the only occasions when workers might have a day, certainly not more, free from their labour. There were, of course, advantages in this, as everyone was able to celebrate at the same time and from which the whole concept of a local celebrations arose. This was not confined to Christian society either. In Roman times, for instance, there was Saturnalia a winter feast where masters changed places with their servants and which centuries later provided elements of what became Christmas.

So our concept of a period of 'time off' took some time to develop and it is only in comparatively modern times that 'holidays' as we understand them, developed.

We still keep some 'holy days', whether with a Christian emphasis or not. Christmas, as a celebration of the birth of Christ, did not appear until about the fourth century AD. But a winter celebration had long been common in many societies. A spring festival, too, was common, celebrating the end of the barren earth and rejoicing in the new growth gradually appearing. Again, there were versions of this, and for Christians it became the most important, part of the Christian Year, the commemoration of the Passion and Resurrection of Jesus.

Ascension, six weeks after Easter, was originally a feast day, reminding us that, although the risen Jesus disappeared from our human sight, He is with us always, and this we celebrate the week after Ascension at Pentecost, or Whitsun, the great feast of the coming of the Holy Spirit, the belief that the Spirit, which is the same word as for wind, and life, is Jesus in us, giving us strength and life. 'Whitsun,' a contraction of White Sunday, was traditionally so called because in the Early Church it was a time for baptisms, at which those to be baptised wore white. In many countries, including Britain, it was a time for feasting and celebration. An 18th century poster advertised the following attractions:

'On Whit Monday, in the morning, will be a punting match...The first boat that comes in to receive a guinea... On Whit Tuesday, in the morning, a fine Holland smock and ribbons, to be run for by girls and young women. And in the afternoon six pairs of buckskin gloves to be wrestled for.'

Since the reorganisation of English bank holidays some years ago the so-called 'Spring Bank Holiday' does not usually coincide with Pentecost, or Whitsun, (though we may often still refer to it as the 'Whit holiday' and in many countries the school half term break takes place at the 'real' Whitsun. Nowadays the Church usually calls it Pentecost, which, fifty days after the Passover, was originally a Jewish harvest festival, and it was at that time when, according to the book of Acts, the followers of Jesus received the Holy Spirit.

The celebration of the coming of the Holy Spirit is an important part of our Christian faith but one that people often find strange and confusing.

The colour for Pentecost is red, symbolising the 'tongues of fire' described in the book of Acts as resting on the heads of the disciples, and another common symbol is a dove, the bird of peace and love.

So as we all look forward to our holidays, let's remember that the origin of these reminded us, and still reminds us, of the important events of the Christian year which form the foundation of our faith.
